Craig Hostetler, Principal, Hostetler Group

Craig Hostetler is nationally recognized as a pioneer in payment reform and practice transformation, particularly for vulnerable populations. Before launching Hostetler Group, he served as executive director of the Oregon Primary Care Association (OPCA) for 15 years. OPCA provides technical assistance and training as well as advocacy for Community Health Centers (CHCs) in Oregon. Under his leadership, OPCA developed an Alternative Care Model learning community and training program for CHCs to implement patient-centered, team-based care under a Medicaid Alternative Payment Methodology (APM). The APM frees clinics from having to produce face-to-face visits with a billable provider. Craig has been leading national discussions on Federally Qualified Health Center APM, preparing for value-based pay, and on the collection of data to demonstrate and improve the value of CHCs—responding to the complex medical, behavioral and socio-economic determinants of health.

Before coming to Oregon, Craig worked in Washington, DC and overseas in London, England, and Sydney, Australia, as a health care manager. Craig has a Masters in Healthcare Administration from the University of Minnesota.



Margaret Brodie, Director, Division of Health Care Services

The Division of Health Care Services provides access and oversight to the full range of appropriate Medicaid health care services to all eligible Alaskans in need. These services include but are not limited to hospitals, physicians, pharmacy, dental, vision, durable medical equipment, and transportation. The division also has the responsibility for protecting Alaska's most vulnerable populations, through its certification and licensing sections.
